## Other Highlights of 2024

- The Diocese of Rockville Centre (DRVC) held its 2024 priesthood ordination on June 8, 2024 at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre, NY. Bishop Barres presented Fr. Dennis Gannon and Fr. Joseph Lettieri to the people of God, announcing their first assignments as priests.
- The May Eucharistic Pilgrimage brought the Blessed Sacrament in a Monstrance from the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Shrine in lower Manhattan across the Brooklyn Bridge in view of the Statue of Liberty. Many participants from our Diocese joined together to witness the truths of our faith and encourage those who are inactive in their faith to rekindle their love for the Eucharist and the Mass.
- The Diocese of Rockville Centre has partnered with the *Franciscan at Home Catechetical Institute* in order to provide formational opportunities via virtual learning.
- During the past year, Catholic Charities increased the number of clients served by 12.6%.
- In June 2024. Four Dominican friars were assigned to create a new Dominican community at St. Barnabas the Apostle parish, the first community of Dominican friars in our diocese.

Last year, Maria Ryan, Director of the Parish Social Ministry at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs, Centerport, introduced us to Sara and her daughter, Belle.

Shortly after their family moved into the area, their daughter Belle was diagnosed with cancer.

This year we were able to speak with Sara, who shared their family's experience with their Parish Social Ministry and how their spiritual life continues to grow despite difficult and emotionally draining times.

Belle is now 6 years old. She was in remission for a time, but the cancer returned and in September, Belle underwent a partial amputation. It was a hard road to travel and due to complications, Belle needed two more surgeries. Belle is very resilient. She attends school and faith formation classes and is upset if she misses any class time. She doesn't let her prosthetic hold her back from the simple pleasure of childhood.

Through these challenging times for the family, their parish, the good works of the PSM and their prayer life nourish and sustain them. Sara has shared that there are times when she knows that Belle does not feel well, but Belle still is adamant that she wants to attend Mass and the parish welcomes them with open arms. Father Gannon grew up as a parishioner of St. Aidan's parish in Williston Park and is a graduate of Holy Child Academy, Chaminade and St. John's University.

Fr. Gannon started his path to the priesthood by going to the Holy Hours at St. Ignatius in Hicksville, and at retreats at the seminary in Huntington.

At our Immaculate Conception Seminary in Huntington and at the St. Joseph's Semininary in Yonkers, the walls are filled with the Ordination Class portraits of all the priests who have been formed at these seminaries and who have served in our Diocese and you have helped to make that possible.
